Kaiser project impact study up for comment

aiser's massive expansion and hospital replacement project was the subject of a special hearing before the City Planning Commission on March 22. On the agenda were the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) and the proposed Master Plan. On April 5, the Planning Commission held a hearing for Design Review of the medical office building and massive garages proposed for the west side of Broadway between MacArthur and 38th, even though there is no approved Master Plan or even a final EIR.

PANIL and KENIC are working together to insure that community comment is presented effectively. KENIC (Kaiser Expansion Neighborhood Impact Coalition) includes neighborhoods from all quadrants of the intersection of MacArthur and Broadway. The KENIC website www.kenic.org shows detailed information and illustrations of the proposal.

Public comments on this project will be accepted until April 17 at 4 pm (see address at end of this story). When they were asked to extend the comment deadline because of the size of the project, the staff of the Planning Commission did not agree, explaining that the final EIR should be released in late May, because the goal was to have the project considered by City Council before the August break. (The last Council meeting would be July 18.)

PANIL and KENIC representatives plan to submit comments by the April 17th deadline. More neighbors are

needed to read a section of the DEIR, identify what issues need further study, what the impacts are likely to be and what mitigation measures make sense for our neighborhoods. Temporary solutions may create long-term problems

The project's 1.78 million square feet is the equivalent of almost 900 two-story houses — where occupants come and go 3 or 4 times an hour. Because Kaiser does not want to consider a temporary satellite location for any of the functions currently at the site, its plan is driven by the question, "Where do we put *this* while we tear down *that?*" A 2 to 5 year construction phasing problem results in awkwardly placed buildings which have an expected 50-year life span.

High-use buildings shoulder to shoulder with homes

Demolition of the current hospital tower which faces MacArthur Boulevard will be the last phase. Because all the Medical Center's functions will be in new facilities by that point, the hospital site will

become a large surface parking lot. with a low-rise administration building fronting MacArthur. The new buildings - with the higher impact uses - will be adjacent to residential areas, such as Manila Ave.

The plan calls for several surface parking lots on the campus and they are potential future building sites for large buildings. They are adjacent to homes.

Sky bridges

Patients and staff who park in the new garage at Broadway and 38th must cross both Broadway and Mac-Arthur to reach the hospital and other clinics. Kaiser proposes sky bridges. We are concerned that sky bridges will have a serious negative effect on our streets. Urban design consultants SMWM state that the sky bridges would "remove pedestrians from the local streets where they are essential to maintain a lively, safe, retail character as an important and positive area of common ground between neighborhood and institution." Furthermore, sky bridges create a style of urban design and a skyline which may not be compatible with our neighborhoods. Also, we should determine what the result of their shadows would be on the public spaces and on the new buildings.

There is an alternative design

At the March 22nd Planning Commission meeting, KENIC speakers supported a community-based alternative design for the project, Alternative IV in the DEIR (page V-32) which gives Kaiser the same number of square feet and the same number of parking spaces. (Anonymous flyers have been distributed in parts of the neighborhood with a mistaken claim of lost parking.) Clinics are clustered closer together, reducing the need for sky bridges. High impact uses and large-scale buildings are placed in different arrangement. The hospital tower is reduced in height by spreading it into a "T" shape, tying it visually to its broad base of clinics and diagnostic departments. The design changes are accomplished by locating some functions at a temporary satellite facility during Phase 2 of the construction.

All of the Planning Commission members present on March 22nd found problems with Kaiser's plan and praiseworthy features in Alternative IV. Noting that Kaiser uses a universal template for all of its (mostly suburban) facilities, one commissioner said that Kaiser's Oakland plan "requires a more radical solution...must be more site-specific and not phasedriven."

Much is at stake, and continued-even increased-participation from neighbors is required. End may be near for New Beginnings

The massage parlor on Broadway and 41st, the site of recent police attention, may loose its massage permit. A decision is pending on the massage permit application of New Beginnings Center, 4107-09 Broadway, as we go to press. A public hearing was held March 20 before the Administrative Hearing Officer of the City Manager's office, which controls massage permits, cabaret licenses and other special (nonzoning) permits.

At the hearing, Officers Bermudez and Bier of the Oakland Police Vice Crime Unit described in graphic detail the February sting operation that resulted in arrests of masseuses for "successful solicitation for sex in exchange for US currency" as well as the discovery of drugs, numerous used condoms and sexually explicit materials. Our own neighborhood Problem Solving Officer Bruce Vallimont and Neighborhood Services Coordinator Paul Brekke-Meisner were present at the hearing. PANIL Steering Committee members Ronile Lahti and Martin Huff, also attended the hearing in support of the police and neighbors. It was the most lurid testimony this writer has sat through since the hearing on Sunshine Spa (operating at this same address) 14 years ago. Two nearby residents, a business owner and this writer speaking as a PANIL representative all described problems created by the massage parlor and its hot tubs. A nearby business owner described how New Beginnings brings violence to the area. In her testimony, she said that, "a street prostitute called her pimp when a customer did not pay for 'services,' and the pimp severely beat the customer in the doorway of the nearby business."

Archway School and Oakland Tech's PTSA had each written letters in opposition to the permit. The attorney for New Beginnings had hired a private investigator to interview nearby businesses and residents. The resulting report quoted a number of people as saying they "had not noticed any problems associated with New Beginnings." Some of these same people had told PANIL they did not feel they could speak out.

The attorney asserted that since no one said they had seen problems, there were none. The owner of New Beginnings Center, Kim Ngo, could offer no examples of steps taken to screen out street prostitutes from the hot tubs; she said she had a sign-in

sheet, but "no one uses their right name anyway." That blurted admission demonstrated a possible reason the attorney earlier claimed the owner did not speak English and he would therefore be speaking for her.

The Oakland Police Department is recommending denial of the massage permit. Any decision of the Administrative Hearing Officer may be appealed to the City Council. The hot tubs, which could attract prostitutes with their customers, require no special permit; problems associated with the hot tubs will have to be addressed through enforcement of the city's nuisance codes against both the business owner and the building owner (who has also been convicted of prostitution).
