





Lake Merritt-

Parkland or a Cathedral?

ity council is likely to vote in October on whether to sell development rights on public land to the Catholic diocese for a large cathedral on Lake Merritt. This 16-story modern structure would sit in front of the Kaiser Convention Center, with an elevated concrete platform extending over 12th and 14th Streets. The property was bought as parkland with bond money voted by Oakland residents in the early 1900s. Discussions have been going on between the diocese and Mayor Jerry Brown and City Manager Robert Bobb for about a year, but City Council has held no public hearing/policy discussion as to whether this is an appropriate use of the land. There is also controversy over the legality of selling the development rights without a vote of the people (as required under state law for sale of parklands acquired by publicly-voted bonds).

A group of concerned architects and landscape architects have proposed an alternative public use of the area. Their approach would reconfigure the freeway-like 12th and 14th Streets by the Convention Center. They would increase parkland on the shoreline, add bike and pedestrian connections through the area, and open up a developable parcel further down the shoreline, next to the Lake Merritt Towers apartments. The sale of this parcel could help finance the public improvements.

Public support for this alternate plan will be needed in the coming weeks. Call the Coalition of Advocates for Lake Merritt (CALM) for further information at 835,3041.

Pioneer Bike Shop

uickly now—can you name a business that's been in the Piedmont Avenue area continuously since 1973 and can help you stay very healthy? It's the Pioneer Bike Shop at 11 Rio Vista Avenue! This bicycle shop is now in its third Piedmont Avenue area location. The current owner, Edmond Gee, took over the business eight years ago. While he does sell new bicycles, his specialty is bicycle repair—of all makes and models. He will be happy to help you repair that bicycle (new or old) that's been sitting in your garage collecting dust.

The Pioneer Bike Shop has been at its current location on Rio Vista for 18 years. You may have seen Edmond on one of his antique bicycles: he rides it in the Piedmont Avenue Halloween Parade most years.

Edmond says the turn around time for bicycle repair is "about a day or so"—something that makes for very happy customers. "I've always had good support and business from the neighborhood, and have not had to do extensive advertising. SUJARO—Adding to the Flavor of Mid-Avenue

f you happen into Sujaro African and World Imports in the late afternoon as I did, you'll find yourself in a kind of sensory jumble. On one hand, there is the wafting smell of popcorn popping from the Piedmont Theatre; on the other, you are met by hundreds of wooden faces staring. Soon, however, the African art that spills out of every nook and cranny and every inch of wall and doorway replaces the familiar with lands and people far away.

Sujaro owner, art lover, and explorer Andrew Berz, moved his business to the Avenue from its original home in Berkeley. He and his wife, Claudia, live in the neighborhood, a decision that keeps their lives simple and allows them to get to know their customers as neighbors, too. Andrew's history with Oakland goes back well beyond the Berkeley store: after law school and before taking off to see the world, Andrew worked for Oakland's Community and Economic Development Agency.

Today, with a partner based in Gambia and a warehouse located in the East Bay, Sujaro sells African art to museums and galleries nationwide. All this from a guy in his 30s who says he loves all kinds of art, from kitschy Hello Kitty to the handmade household wares and decorative arts found in African villages across Central and West Africa. Don't look for Japanese pop art, however, in Sujaro. Here the passion is clearly African with a bit of Mexican silver thrown in.

Many of us were sad when the rubberstamp business, next to the theatre, closed. We feared what new chain food or beverage shop or nail salon would lease the tiny storefront. This time, we were lucky. Now after an evening of living someone else's life at the movies, we can delay our return to our own lives by feasting on the wood, cloth, stone and beaded crafts of someone living in a very different neighborhood. From Sujaro's African art to the nearby shops offering exotic teas, fancy cookware, beautiful stationary, and the Piedmont Theatre's better-than-usual cinema, the corner of Piedmont Avenue and Linda Street is evolving into something interesting indeed.
